He told His prophet, Samuel, to anoint David, a young shepherd from Bethlehem, as Saul's eventual replacement.


When God turned away from Saul, the king was tormented by an evil spirit. David entered Saul's service and soothed him by playing a harp.


For Lent, You Can Give Alms to Children in Peru

On Ash Wednesday, March 6, we will begin the Church season of Lent. One important thing Jesus asks us to do in Lent is to give alms.

For 18 years, children in the Rockford Diocese have taken part in an almsgiving project that is theirs alone.

Last year young Catholics here sent 652 hearts and \$3,173 to help school children in the Diocese of Chulucanas in Peru.
