Vatican Gifts Delight Fifth-Grader

WESTFIELD, N.J. (OSV News)— Dominic Auricchio, a fifth-grader at Holy Trinity School in Westfield, surprised his family this past Christmas by asking for a military Bible and a rosary blessed by Pope Francis.

Dominic said that he requested the items because he enjoys learning about religion at school and because he wants to become a priest and a military chaplain when he grows up. He also dreams of meeting the pope.

On Christmas morning, he joyfully unwrapped seven religious gifts: a military Bible, a crucifix featuring the Stations of the Cross, a rosary, a miraculous medal, a vial of holy water, a chalice made of wood from the Holy Land, and an Italian prayer card. The Bible, holy water, rosary beads and crucifix came from the Vatican and were blessed by Pope Francis.

Dominic, an altar server at St. Helen's Parish in Westfield, said he "loves everything about being Catholic."

The Auricehios' faith has kept them strong since last January when Dominic received a serious medical diagnosis — a brain mass — detected through an MRI.

Every night, his mother prayed to the Blessed Mother. One night in May, Dominic awoke to a vision of a woman in his bedroom, who he said was the Blessed Mother, his mother said. The woman asked him to reassure his mother.

The next month, a CT scan revealed that the mass had begun to shrink on its own, without medical intervention — a development that Dominic and his family attribute to the intercession of the Blessed Mother.
