First 'Mercy Day'

St. Edward CCHS institutes day of confessions March 20

ELGIN—During Lent, the Diocese of Rockford holds its annual Be Reconciled Day, this year on March 29. Parishes around the diocese offer confessions (where possible) from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. The wide range of times makes confession accessible to hundreds of Catholics.

But for high school students who are in class before 9 a.m. and may be occupied after school with sports, clubs and studying until long after 8 p.m., confession may still be out of reach on March 29.

So to meet the spiritual needs of its students, St. Edward Central Catholic High School will hold its first-ever "Mercy Day" just over a week before, on March 20.

In a video at https://stedhs.org/, spiritual advisor and assistant principal Father Robert Blood invites the school and Elgin community to come, speaking first of the school's mission this year to "serve the Lord with laughter."

But "if we're honest," he says, "there are certain points in our life where I don't feel like laughing. I might be struggling or weighed down or frustrated. And in the season of Lent, in a particular way, Jesus is saying to us, 'I don't want you to have to be burdened. I want you to experience freedom and light."

Students will be able to attend during their theology classes. Then, from 3:15-8 p.m., Father Blood will offer drive-through confessions for

members of local parishes and the parents, alumni, siblings and other members of the St. Edward CCHS community in the Greg True Field parking lot, 335 Locust St.

Those attending are welcome to come alone or in a group. "If you come with a car full of people — which I hope you do — you can park and walk up one by one," Father Blood explains.

"Rain or shine, I'm gonna be here," he says.

And to those who may be uncertain or nervous about coming to confession, Father Blood offers reassurance: "The Lord just wants you to be unburdened.

"So, we pray for that grace and the confidence to take part in Mercy Day here at St. Edward High School. See you soon!"


